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### Description

Identification signs include:

- the tip of the young shoot has a heavy coat of flat-lying hairs,
- the young leaves are yellow with bronze patches,
- the shoot has a ribbed surface with green internodes,
- wedge-shaped adult leaves, 3 or 5 lobes with an open U-shaped or closed petiolar sinus, moderate to large teeth with convex or straight sides; an absence of anthocyanin coloration of veins; dark green leaf blade, moderately bubbled and the underside with an absence or slight cover of flat-lying and upright hairs,
- round-shaped or slightly elliptical-shaped berries.

## Phenology

Bud burst: 4 days after Chasselas. Grape maturity: period II, 3 weeks after Chasselas.

## Suitability for cultivation and agronomic production

Humagne rouge N is fairly vigorous and displays steady fertility. It is adapted well exposed and to moderately or not very fertile soils.

## Sensitivity to diseases and pests

Humagne rouge N is not very susceptible to grey rot.

## Technological potential

Humagne rouge N grape clusters and berries are moderate size. This grape variety produces not very acid and light wines. Moderate sugar potential and good maturity is required to avoid herbaceous characteristics.

## Clonal selection in France

The only approved Humagne rouge N clone carries the number 6002.
